 - 1. Expanded Connectivity Network access now reaches billions more, especially via mobile broadband, empowering e-governance, healthcare, education, and MSMEs, aligned with WSIS Action Lines C1-C11.
 - 2. Multistakeholder Governance The IGF and regional/national Internet governance bodies have institutionalized inclusive dialogue among governments, civil society, technical and business actors.
 - 3. Localized Content & IDNs Support for Internationalized Domain Names and local-language resources has begun narrowing the global content gap.
 - 4. ICT in Development & Emergencies Tools deployed for health, education, disaster response (e-government, digital IDs) validates WSIS's development-oriented vision.
 - 5. Digital Skills & Capacity Building Numerous programs, often involving young women, have strengthened regional technical competencies in Africa.

 - 5. Uneven Financing & Infrastructure Underinvestment in backbone networks, data centers, and digital public infrastructure undermines equitable digital growth.

 - 2. Boost Digital Skills & Inclusion Implement nationwide programs for women, youth, persons with disabilities, focusing on AI, cybersecurity, and digital entrepreneurship.
 - 3. Harmonize Governance Systems Align ICT regulation with human rights, data protection, and privacy principles; enable interoperable frameworks.
 - 4. Strengthen Cybersecurity & Trust -Scale regional CERTs, promote cyber hygiene campaigns, and foster public-private partnerships.
 - 5. Promote Digital Financing Launch affordable digital credit schemes for SMEs, prioritize public digital infrastructure investments, and mobilize development bank support.

 - 1. Digital Entrepreneurship & Local Innovation Ecosystems Highlight youth-led startups and their role in inclusive development.

 - 3. Ethical AI & Algorithmic Accountability Emphasize fairness, transparency, and equitable access to AI resources in the Global South.
