

Excellencies, distinguished delegates, and colleagues,

Thank you for the hard work that has brought us from the *Zero Draft* to *Revision 1* of the WSIS+20 Outcome Document. This new text is a genuine step forward — clearer, stronger, and more attuned to the voices of those who engaged in the process. The co-facilitators have listened, and it shows.

But as we look ahead, our task is to ensure that this document doesn't just mark progress on paper — it drives progress in practice.

First, let's move from commitment to implementation.

Revision 1 now uses the language of action — we *commit*, we *urge*, we *reaffirm*. But commitments only matter when they translate into measurable outcomes.

By 2027, every Member State should have a **national digital inclusion plan** that aligns with WSIS Action Lines and explicitly names the groups we so often speak about — women and girls, older persons, Indigenous peoples, migrants, refugees, and persons with disabilities.

And to keep ourselves accountable, the UN system should establish, by mid-2027, a **public dashboard** tracking connectivity, affordability, and digital literacy across all countries — disaggregated by gender, geography, and disability.

Let's make "closing digital divides" something we can *see* and *measure*.

Second, collaboration must be our engine — and the Internet Governance Forum is where that collaboration lives.

The IGF, along with its regional and national initiatives, has shown what inclusive, evidence-based policy dialogue looks like. Rather than inventing new processes, let's **invest in the ones that already work**. Let's give the IGF the tools to go beyond discussion — to become a true *implementation and coordination hub* for digital cooperation.

That means:

- Ensuring sustainable funding for the IGF and its regional networks;
- Tasking each Member State to support an active national IGF by 2027, with meaningful participation from youth, civil society, and technical experts;
- And mandating that outputs from these IGFs directly inform UN digital policy processes, closing the loop between dialogue and decision.

Because strengthening the IGF system is how we make multistakeholderism real — not just a word in our communiqués.

Finally, we must match ambition with resources.

Revision 1 speaks more clearly about financing and capacity-building, but now we need to act.

Let's establish a **Digital Development Task Force** — as the text proposes — to design blended-finance mechanisms that empower local innovators and community networks. And by 2027, every least developed country should host at least one **centre of excellence in digital governance**, building local capacity for inclusive, rights-based digital transformation.

Colleagues — we have a stronger text.

It is more grounded, more inclusive, and more action-oriented.

But the work begins now.

Let's make WSIS+20 not just a milestone, but a turning point — where we move from promises to progress, from dialogue to delivery, and from connection to true inclusion.
