I. Event Description

Nepal Administrative Staff College (NASC), in collaboration with <u>the United Nations Department of</u> <u>Economic and Social Affairs (UN DESA)</u>, through its <u>Project Office on Governance (UNPOG)</u> of the <u>Division for Public Institutions and Digital Government (DPIDG)</u>, and with support from the_UN Resident Coordinator Office and United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) in Nepal_is coorganizing a 2 and half day Training of Trainers (TOT) Workshop on Effective National to Local Governance for Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) Implementation in Nepal, to be held in 13 – 15 May 2025 in Kathmandu, Nepal.

The TOT Workshop comes as response to the expressed need for capacity development by Nepal Administrative Staff College (NASC) in 2023. The content of the workshop is provided by UN DESA's¹ <u>Curriculum on Governance for Sustainable Development Goals</u>. The Curriculum aims to promote a critical understanding of sustainable development issues, enhance governance capacity, and strengthen public servants' awareness of their active role in contributing to achieving the SDGs.

The TOT Workshop will be conducted in a hybrid format where the participants from Nepal will attend in person and invited speakers will virtually participate via the Zoom platform. The Workshop will be attended by trainers from NASC, the Province Research and Training Center Provincial Training Academy (PTA), Provincial Center for Good Governance (PCGG), the Local Development Training Academy (LDTA), Public Finance Management Training Center (PFMTC), National Planning Commission (NPC) and UN officials and other invited international experts and officials from participating countries, among others.

2. Context

The United Nations General Assembly Resolution <u>A/RES/69/327</u> emphasizes the growing need to strengthen public institutions and services at all levels supporting sustainable development. Building effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels is key for the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, and Nepal's 16th Five-year National Development Plan (2024/25–2028/29). The UN Secretary-General's Report, "<u>Our Common Agenda</u>"², emphasizes improving people's experience with public institutions at all levels and basic services. In his <u>special</u> edition report on progress towards the <u>SDGs</u>, the UN Secretary-General has urged governments to strengthen national and sub-national capacity, accountability and public institutions to deliver accelerated SDG progress. The report recognizes the central role of local and sub-national governments in implementing the SDGs, including by designing national enabling frameworks to allow sub-national governments to meet their devolved responsibilities and by strengthening their capacities and resources to advance the SDGs.³

Delivering change at the speed and scale required by the SDGs demands more than ever from public institutions and political leaders at all levels. Transparent, effective, accountable, resilient and adequately resourced institutions are the bedrock of the implementation of the 2030 Agenda. Accelerating the implementation of the 2030 Agenda is contingent upon strengthening institutions and the capacity of policymakers to design and implement inclusive, sustainable development policies and strategies. The <u>principles of effective governance for sustainable development</u>, developed by the UN Committee of Experts on Public Administration (CEPA) and endorsed by the United Nations Economic

and Social Council (ECOSOC) in 2018, are designed to achieve this purpose: they provide guidance to transform the role of institutions and policymaking, promote new governance norms and shift from past practices to transformative pathways that strengthen resilience and accelerate action to achieve the SDGs.

Public institutions and public servants must have the capacity and strategies to continually revisit and adjust policy implementation to maximize benefits and capitalize on synergies while understanding trade-offs and identifying feedback loops. Localization, anchored on the principle of multi-level governance and multi-stakeholder collaboration, is a key approach for greater inclusion and sustainability. Local and regional governments have a key role to play in this process since 65 percent of the SDG targets are linked to their work and mandates. As the sphere of government closest to local communities, they are essential for responding to the erosion of the social contract and for protecting our societies amid intersecting global crises.

Nepal has incorporated the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development in its national policies, plans and programs. It has been consistently working to localize these efforts at the sub-national and community levels. The Government of Nepal took a strategic decision to integrate the 2030 Agenda, into its national development framework at an early juncture. This was expedited by the creation of the SDG Status and Roadmap 2016-2030, an SDG Needs Assessment, Costing and Financing Strategy and Localization Guidelines. The 15th plan (2019/20-2023/24) fully featured the SDGs within its 10 national goals and placed considerable emphasis on the importance of productive partnerships needed to attain the country's development ambitions. Nepal has articulated its aspirations in Vision 2100 and plans to graduate from a least developed country category by 2022 to a high middle-income country by achieving the SDGs by 2030 and the 25-year vision to become a developed country by 2043. Nepal has been reasonably successful to date in making progress towards the SDGs, however some areas require reinvigorated efforts to continue to build on otherwise positive momentum.⁴

Governance and effective institutions constitute a key pillar of socioeconomic transformation of Nepal. They are prerequisites to achieve the national agenda in all sectors. The 16th Plan, which is based on the broad aspiration of "Good Governance, Social Justice, and Prosperity," emphasizes on the acceleration of implementation of the SDGs to achieve the national development goals. It aims to enhance development and governance in people's daily lives and strengthening institutions. The Plan focuses on reinforcing provincial and local economies and achieving balanced development through a series of strategic programs. To fulfill Vision 2100 aspirations, the institutions and governance will need to become modern, innovative, accountable to citizens, and rooted in the rule of law.

Nepal faces a range of new and emerging challenges such as climate change, poverty and inequality, Covid-19 pandemic, financing gaps, digital divide, insufficient institutional capacities, trade barriers, limited market access, and geopolitical challenges that complicate its progress toward SDGs implementation.⁵ Additionally, local governments in Nepal face numerous challenges including institutional capacity gaps, data availability and monitoring, resource constraints, coordination and partnerships and awareness and ownership. Addressing these challenges requires comprehensive policy adjustments, better coordination among stakeholders through multi-level governance, increased investments, and enhanced capacity building to effectively implement SDGs at the local level.

3. Objectives

The TOT Workshop on "Effective National to Local Governance for SDG Implementation in Nepal" aims to enhance the capacity of trainers and local government officials to accelerate the implementation of the 2030 Agenda and Nepal Vision 2100. Specifically, the workshop will:

- Provide a comprehensive understanding of the SDGs and their integration into national and local policies and planning frameworks.
- Strengthen institutional capacities and coordination mechanisms to ensure effective multi-level governance for sustainable development.
- Identify and apply various innovative financing mechanisms to advance local SDG
- implementation
- Equip participants with tools and methodologies for reporting the SDGs.
- Foster peer learning and knowledge exchange of innovative practices and approaches to localizing the SDGs.

4. Thematic Focus

The TOT Workshop will provide a holistic and integrated framework for capacity development in governance and public institutions at the local level. The Workshop will cover the following themes (See Section 10. Workshop Agenda):

- SDG Localization
- Multi-level Governance
- Institutional Arrangements
- Multi-stakeholder Engagement
- Financing for SDG Localization
- Data, Monitoring & Reporting

5. Methodology

The TOT Workshop will feature expert presentations, hands-on interactive activities, group discussions and innovative practices for peer-to-peer learning. The activities and group discussions will enable participants to transform in-depth learning into practice. It will be conducted in a hybrid modality. The workshop will be conducted in English.

6. Target Audience

The target audience for the TOT Workshop will include trainers and officials from NASC, PCGG, LDTA, PTA, PFMTC, and NPC. The total number of participants will be limited to a maximum of 25.

7. Duration

The TOT will be conducted over a three-day period, from 13 May 2025 to 15 May 2025.

8. Venue

The TOT will be held at the Nepal Administrative Staff College, located in Jawalakhel, Lalitpur, Nepal.

9. Expected Outcomes

The TOT Workshop is specifically designed to enhance the capacities of the trainers from NASC, PCGG and LDTA for the institutional application of the 11 Principles of Effective Governance for Sustainable Development to strengthen institutions for accelerating the implementation of the SDGs, and Nepal Vision 2100 at all levels. It is expected that by the end of the Workshop, participants will have:

- A common understanding of the Principles of Effective Governance for Sustainable Development and their application in institutional arrangements at all levels to achieve the shared vision for the people and the planet as embodied in the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.
- Enhanced understanding of whole-of-government approaches for strengthening vertical coordination and aligning national to local planning to accelerate SDG progress.
- Gained an understanding of how to promote a whole-of-society approach for national to local planning to ensure effective stakeholder engagement in public governance and leave no one behind.
- Enhanced understanding of innovative mechanisms to strengthen financial viability at the local level.
- Improved effective national-to-local coordination and monitoring, evaluation and reporting for SDG Implementation
- Developed an action plan for effective governance mechanisms to deliver the 2030 Agenda and Nepal Vision 2100.
- > Developed a roadmap to guide the implementation of the action plans.

10. Follow-up Actions

- > Participants: Incorporating the new knowledge from the workshop into the training programme.
- NASC: Conduct internal capacity-building sessions to share UN training insights with fellow trainers and create mentorship or peer-learning groups to reinforce learning.
- UNPOG/DPIDG/UN DESA: Provide technical assistance to NASC's capacity building sessions.
