1]. Making public governance work for the post-2015 development agenda

- [1.1] What are the major factors accountable for a non-harmonious and productive relationship between these Parties?
- [1.2] In developing countries with democratic governments {elected}, what lessons can be learned from the "best practice' cases, with particular attention to the relationship between The Executive and the Judiciary branches; such factor appears to create constant frictions between the Executive and The Legislature, with resulting political instability and its impact on the climate for public as well as private investments.

2]. Stakeholders accountability in public governance for development

[2.1] **In Emerging economies** with *Sovereign Wealth Funds*: What are the criteria and legal procedures by The Executive to use these funds? [2.2] In **Developing countries** which (for a significant %) depend on foreign Aid to implement government programs, one **major** problem is the lack of coordination between the Donors and Governments. We have in mind the recent case of foreign aid for reconstructions in Haiti following the earthquake in 2010!

<u>One proposal:</u> For *each* government department/ line ministry, the foreign aid envelope / package **should** be approved, monitored and reported through the following institutional structure:

- One Coordinating Committee [representatives of Govt.- Donors NGOs]
- One Plan of Action approved by the Committee
- One Monitoring and Reporting system which provides electronic instantaneous flows of information to members of the Committee. [as illustrated in my publication posted on unpan website: Manual of government expenditure planning and monitoring: Medium Term and Performance budgeting.]
