It is for the Experts Committee to review and consider as appropriate:

- 1. Need to examine the country constitution for inherent faults: e.g. Indian Constitution encourages disunity and division among people based on religion, caste, creed, race, colour, etc. What was considered useful is NOW becoming a poison in the 65+ yrs of independence.
- 2. Democratize public empowerment, not petty corruption.
- 3. Enhance laws, procedures and systems to prevent/curb corruption, if not able to eradicate totally. E.g. have a good system followed by NY Motor Vehicles Department in granting driving and vehicle licensing. Good example to ensure efficiency, equity. fairness and good surveillance system after the issue of licences. Worst examples can be found in India in confirming that longer such defaults continue the quality of public life goes down!
- 4. Every govt talks about transparency and accountability, but does nothing to follow up on their promises. Main weakness is the system and archaic and colonial laws, procedures and process.
- 5. Important pillars of good governance: a viable/sustainable bureaucracy, responsible legislature (law-makers) and watchdogs of transparency & accountability; an independent law enforcement system, totally unconnected with the political power source; a criminal justice system, incorruptible and efficient.
- 6. Building a quality society to face the challenges of the century and beyond: health, education (with greater focus on primary and girls education), environmental management, incl public hygiene, water management.
- 7. Govts should be told that it is not their business to be in business in selling bread and butter in retail. Manage the infrastructures (all kinds) and create enabling environment for wealth creation and distributive justice.
