

This roadmap is just one step in the journey of the Global Taskforce of Local and Regional Governments to support subnational governments and partners to localize the SDGs and achieve inclusive and sustainable development for all.

We hope that the international community, national governments and civil society will join us in working to localize the 2030 Agenda across the world.

Going forward, it is essential that the awareness-raising, advocacy, implementation and monitoring of the SDGs at local level, particularly for SDG 11 on Sustainable Cities and Human Settlements, is linked up with the New Urban Agenda adopted at Habitat III. This is essential in order to harness both agendas effectively and avoid confusion, overlaps, or gaps in action on the ground.
