Transforming Public Institutions

"Moving from commitments to results", is an encompassing item of discussion on the subject noted above. Reading the sub-items of discussion, in between the lines, the 4th one, "Strengthening the confidence of citizens in the effectiveness, validity and integrity of public administration through enhanced targeted efforts to use good governance to prevent, expose and deal with corruption", forms the bedrock for transforming public institutions. To identify the core relevance of this item, we need to understand the potential of culture.

Culture Sans Conscience

Death of the body is not such a loss as the death of conscience. The virus of this killer disease has spread all around. After afflicting the conscience, the virus spreads to the head and heart. It brings with it greed and graft which destroys all human values. Being infectious, it acquires the dimensions of an epidemic. Although the virus may not cause physical death, yet it causes the death of all that is good and virtuous.

Conscience is the light of soul and raises its voice in protest wherever anything is thought of or done contrary to righteousness. If conscience stings once, it is an admonition, if twice, it is condemnation. Why have we become deaf to its voice? Insensitive to its pricks? The answer is corruption rampant everywhere. It is painful reality that corruption has become a way of life. Flowing from the top to the bottom, corruption has affected all aspects of living.

Remember the age old question, "Which came first, the hen or the egg?" Now we ask, "Which came first, corruption in the public institutions or in the general public?' The lust for easy money gives birth to the twins: corruption and bribery.

Of the various kinds of corruption, the worst is the one that subverts the system. Public Institutions plagued with corruption face a challenge to their credibility. Can we expect any potential of such a corrupt culture for transforming public institutions or promoting sustainable development in the economic, social or environmental fields? To expose and prevent corruption, the campaign should be seen and supported as a mass movement on the lines of national campaign against small-pox or polio.

A tinge of conscience is a glimpse of God. In the present day of gloom and doom when human values are declining and morals are reclining, giving way to corruption that has impoverished the whole societal set up, solace lies in spirituality. Corruption starts where belongingness ends. The means through which we can spread belongingness is spirituality. We can make any number of laws to remove corruption but it is the spiritual stability, that provides the key to a secure and responsible society.

For politicians serving in the Public Institutions, — politics is mainly about caring for people and providing for their welfare. Politics without ethics and human values would result in chaos, crime and corruption. Politicians who shun spirituality can be detrimental even dangerous to society. The Bhagwat Gita says, "He who abandons the commandments of the scriptures and lives as his desires prompt him, attains neither spiritual perfection, nor worldly happiness, nor liberation. Therefore, let the scriptures be the norm in determining what should be done and what is not to be done. Sometimes a spiritual journey is all it takes to find the simplest solution to the greatest problem.

Arnold Toynbee, a distinguished historian, studied the genesis and fall of 21 different civilizations spanning a period of 9000 years and found that 19 of them declined and disappeared when the religious foundations that sustained them became corrupt. He says, "Each time, the people lost faith in religion, its civilization succumbed to social disintegration. The new civilization that replaced such downfall was inspired by religion founded on actual knowledge of God.

The fundamental outcome from Rio Conference held on 12 February 2013 for Sustainable Development was the fact that we are heading towards a set of economic, social and environment crisis. People are important but equally important is the planet on which their prosperity depends. Religious terrorism, psychological attitudes and many other factors combined, we are behaving as if the planet is a business in liquidation. This calls for awareness and dramatic change, to recognise it as a spiritual issue, a challenge that goes to the core of who we are as human beings. With ever growing grip of chaos and violence in our lives, spirituality has a game-changing role to play in reminding us of our humanity.

Salient points for transforming Public Institutions

• Prosperity of Institution has a meaning when there is integrity-based common welfare built in the system. When you have integrity, nothing else matters. And if you do not have integrity, nothing else matters.

• The absolute sanctity be attached to Trust which means many things. But, first and foremost, it is a deep sense of honour, and fulfilling the commitment. Good results follow the good work done. Trust is like electricity. You cannot see it but you can see the light. Cherish it, and it grows. Neglect it and it wilts.

• Individual reputation though counts, yet more important is the reputation of the institution to which one belongs. There is no substitute for dynamic thinking, drive and hard work in whatever role one plays in Public Institutions.

• Whether a Chairman, Secretary, Director or a simple employee, all must remember that they are humans and members of human family. It is important to ensure stability, integrity, transparency and productivity in the Institution.

• In such an environment, selfishness, greed and ego give way to selflessness and care for the institution, its propriety and gaining confidence of the masses, thereby developing transformative leadership and enhancing competencies of public servants.

• It seems, materialism and spiritualism have little in common. But the common factor in both the fields is human being. Therefore, feeling of cosmic kinship is of primary and prime importance.

• Divine virtues and clean life shapes one's character and reflect in one's action. It is human factor that gives an institution its character. Divine virtues when filtered to the grass roots, evoke feelings of loyalty, unity and help to allign all the interests within the institution for good governance.
