## 'Leaving No one Behind'

For the 2030 Agenda of Sustainable Development to be achieved, effective delivery of public services is needed. Leaving no one behind is an ambitious objective for any Member State. It is at the core of Sustainable Development Goal-16, in particular the promotion of inclusive societies and the rule of law. The ongoing covid -19, pandemic has brought to light the pivotal role of the public administration in response to pandemic, governments around the world diverting the public finances, national resources to crisis response in mitigating the effects of pandemic the role of public servants, and essential workers as first responders is essential in continuity of public services.
